

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*Invocation and Lord's Prayer

Holy Spirit, Jesus says he is the bread of life, that if we come to him we will not be hungry. Yet, we weep and rage because some people have stockpiles while other do not have enough. Weep and rage with us when we feel overwhelmed by the injustice of the world. Move with us that we might co-create a table where all know what enough feels like and every prayer for daily bread is answered... Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

The next day the crowd that had stayed on the other side of the lake saw that there had been only one boat there. 
When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.' Then they said to him, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?' Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.' So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat." 'Then Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world. 'They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.'

Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Fine Arts Hallway Display, Bill Goffrier

Bill grew up in Wichita, first learning to paint from Betty Dickerson, Wilma Wethington, and Don Weddle. After earning a degree in fine art from WSU he obtained his master's degree in painting from Boston University in 1985.

His first professional exhibit was local, at Reuben Saunder's Artworks Gallery in 1980. Since then his work has been exhibited across the U.S., from Maine to Alaska.

Bill's current series of Wichita oils, "Authenti-City", started in 2014 after his return to Wichita and now numbers 331 paintings. The subjects include iconic, historic, unique and beautiful elements of the city. The College Hill neighborhood, including Plymouth Congregational Church, is particularly well represented. Most of the original paintings are already in private collections but are available as art prints directly from Goffrier Studios.

Much of his current work is by commission. His art is owned by private collectors internationally, and the Wichita Sedgwick County Historical Museum includes his work in their permanent collection.

Fine Arts Display Case, August/September — Linda Gebert

I have worked in and taught enameling and jewelry making for many years now, having begun my formal university training in painting and graphic design, before receiving a degree in Art History. But it remained enameling and jewelry that held my fascination. Through workshops with prominent artists in the fields and persistent study and practice. I pursued expertise in silversmithing and enameling. I consequently taught enameling and silversmithing at the Wichita Center for the Arts for many years in the 1980's and '90's. As President of the Midwest Enamelist Guild for 10 years, I brought in renowned enamelists for well-attended annual workshops with guest artists at the Center. Later, I taught silversmithing at Wichita State University for 5 years before returning to the studio full-time. The Enamel Arts Foundation in Los Angeles bought 6 of my wall pieces and jewelry in 2019 to add to their large retrospective collection of American enamelists for study. I currently enjoy working in the enamel/metals studio at Mark Arts with other enamelists and students, and in my home studio. In more recent years I have added silk painting for a change of pace. Besides being bought by collectors, my enamel pieces and jewelry are in permanent collections at the Yale University Art Gallery, Arkansas Museum of Fine Arts, Crocker Gallery in Sacramento, CA., Mark Arts, Wichita, KS and the Clay and Glass Museum, Toronto, Canada.


