

Scripture Reading

In the days when the judges ruled, there was a famine in the land, and a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to live in the country of Moab, he and his wife and two sons. The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. They went into the country of Moab and remained there. But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. These took Moabite wives; the name of one was Orpah and the name of the other Ruth. When they had lived there for about ten years, both Mahlon and Chilion also died, so that the woman was left without her two sons or her husband.

Then she started to return with her daughters-in-law from the country of Moab, for she had heard in the country of Moab that the Lord had had consideration for his people and given them food.

So she set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah. But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, 'Go back each of you to your mother's house. May the Lord deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me. The Lord grant that you may find security, each of you in the house of your husband.' Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud. They said to her, 'No, we will return with you to your people.' But Naomi said, 'Turn back, my daughters, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands? Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband. Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons, would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying? No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the Lord has turned against me.'Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her.

So she said, 'See, your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sister-in-law.' But Ruth said,

'Do not press me to leave you

or to turn back from following you!

Where you go, I will go;

where you lodge, I will lodge;

your people shall be my people,

and your God my God.

Where you die, I will die-

there will I be buried.

May the Lord do thus and so to me,

and more as well,

if even death parts me from you!'





Fine Arts Display Case

Welcome Svitlana Tararuk

Welcome to Svitlana Tararuk, our display case artist for November and December. As Ukrainian artist, the tradition of decorating Easter eggs, or "pysanky," holds a profound significance in my life and creative expression. It is a celebration of heritage, spirituality, and the cyclical nature of life. Each design is carefully considered and often inspired by traditional motifs. My artistic journey is deeply rooted in personal experiences and observations. Emotions play a pivotal role in my creative process. I believe that art is a bridge between cultures and generations. Beyond the aesthetic aspect, my work carries a deeper message about resilience and hope. In the face of challenges, the act of creating pysanky becomes a meditative process, allowing me to reflect on themes of renewal and transformation, and giving me a feeling of stability. Each egg is a



symbol of new beginnings, and through my art I aspire others to embrace their own journeys of growth and discoveries.

Fine Arts Hallway Display

Born in Wichita, Pam Bjork's creative journey has been shaped by a lifetime of rich experiences and global exploration. After attending UC Berkeley in 1968-69, she spent 26 years as a restaurateur in Colorado and Kansas, earning recognition such as the Business in the Arts Award. Her travels have taken her across five continents, where she participated in and observed diverse cultural ceremonies that deeply inform her artistic practice.

Pam's work reflects her belief in the presence of the sacred in everyday life. She finds inspiration in the objects and environments that surround us, from a pair of cloisonné lovebirds brought back from

Singapore by her father to the quilt lovingly stitched by her grandmother. Through her art, she invites viewers to explore the deeper meanings and connections these items hold, reminding us that as archetypal psychologist James Hillman suggests, "All things are full of Gods.


